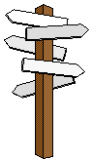

COMMANDER'S CORNER



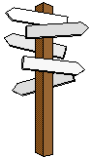
Spring has sprung. That means the month of May is upon us. May is our biggest month for raising money for our hospitalized veterans and for those organizations that support them. We typically donate \$10,000 to \$12,000 a year. To raise this money takes volunteers -- lots of volunteers. Memorial Day weekend and the Herndon Festival are just around the corner. Our two largest fund raisers will take place during this time -- our Poppy Campaign on Memorial Day weekend starting Saturday morning, May 24 through Monday, May 26 and our snow cone sales at the festival. This year the festival is scheduled from Thursday, May 29 – Sunday, June 3. In addition to all that, we will be flying our Avenue of Flags and will have our annual Memorial Day Observance at Chestnut Grove Cemetery on Monday morning, May 26. Our Memorial Day guest speaker this year will be Fairfax County Dranesville District Supervisor John Foust. Please help us this year with these events. Each and every year it seems to get more and more difficult to come up with the number of volunteers needed to fulfill our fund raising commitments. I ask those who have faithfully come out year after year to, once again, give us your time. For those who have not volunteered, **please help.** We will need volunteers for three hour shifts at the various grocery stores in Herndon and Reston for our poppy campaign. We need to provide seventy hours of marshal duty (3 or 4 hour shifts) to the town as payment for us to set up our snow cone booth at the Herndon Festival. As a marshal you meet and greet and pass out the Festival guide to the attendees at the various entrances to the grounds and make sure they are abiding by the rules of entry. Walkie-talkies are provided as well as a festival T-shirt which you get to keep (the T-shirt not the walkie talkie). And, of course, we need to man our snow cone booth for the four day festival. If you have never made a snow cone and seen the expression on a young child's face when you hand it to them, then your missing a great pleasurable experience. We also will be putting out our grave flags at Chestnut Grove cemetery and will need help with setting up the Avenue of Flags. Please see the volunteer schedules on **pages 4 and 5** and call the legion at **703-481-1200** and leave a voice mail early to reserve the times that best fit your schedule. Please consider volunteering for two or three events. We will be calling you soon.

Veterans Receive Much Needed Funding

WASHINGTON, DC (January 17, 2008) – Thanks to the bipartisan support of Congress and the White House, America’s veterans will receive much needed funding for the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA).

“Veterans are very much in need of this additional funding,” said Marty Conatser, national commander of The American Legion after being notified that President George W. Bush formally requested an additional \$3.7 billion in “emergency” appropriations for VA in FY 2008.

The president recently signed the Consolidated Appropriations Act of FY 2008 providing funding for the remainder of the federal budget except the Department of Defense. In an agreement reached between Congress and the president, the bill contained a provision to add an additional \$3.7 billion for VA funding.

“The American Legion greatly appreciates the congressional leadership – from both sides of the aisle – for working closely with me and my colleagues to provide VA with a budget worthy of the sacrifices of the men and women of the armed forces, veterans, and their families,” Conatser said. “No veteran should ever be denied an earned benefit for honorable military service.”

Congress authorized recently-separated service members from Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi Freedom enrollment in the VA health care delivery system, to receive free health care for two years, and remain in the system if so desired. Currently, more than 7 million veterans are enrolled in the VA system.

“This Congress and the commander in chief met or exceeded the funding recommendations of the veterans’ community,” Conatser pointed out. “In all my years with The American Legion, this budget stands out as a monumental achievement.”

American Legion Commander to Congress: Pass Surveillance Law Now

INDIANAPOLIS, IN (February 25, 2008) – Congress should put America’s national security ahead of frivolous lawsuits, American Legion National Commander Marty Conatser said today. The head of the nation’s largest veterans’ organization sent a letter to members of the House of Representatives, urging them to pass an important intelligence-gathering law immediately.

“Since this war began, the Congress has done an exemplary job of ensuring that the nation’s fighting men and women are the best-trained and best-equipped military ever in American history,” National Commander Marty Conatser wrote. “Today, The American Legion asks you to continue this precedent by equipping the intelligence assets with the necessary tools needed to provide these dedicated troops the very best information available by timely enactment of S.2248, The Foreign Intelligence and Surveillance Act (FISA).”

The bill had bipartisan support in the Senate but is stuck in the House because leaders there do not believe telecommunications companies should be protected from lawsuits that arise from cooperating with surveillance requests.

Sen. Jay Rockefeller, D-West Va., the Chairman of the Select Committee on Intelligence, also supports the bill. “Unfortunately, much of the debate over this bill has focused on liability protection for telecommunications carriers, instead of the new civil liberties protections and oversight mechanisms that have been included.”

Rockefeller said in a statement posted on his Senate web site. “We should not hold the carriers hostage to years of litigation for stepping forward when the country asked for help and providing assistance they believed to be legal and necessary. The fact is, if we lose cooperation from these or other private companies, our national security will suffer.”

Conatser pointed out to Representatives that the National Intelligence Estimate noted that the United States will face a persistent and evolving threat over the next three years, with the main threat coming from Islamic terrorist groups and cells.

“It defies all common sense to give lawsuits a higher priority than national security,” Conatser said. “The American people expect Congress to protect America, not the lawsuit lobby. This surveillance is aimed at terrorists who want to kill innocent Americans. The government is not interested in phone calls that you make to Aunt Sally.”

American Legion to Congress: Support Petraeus and his mission

WASHINGTON, DC (April 9, 2008) – Congress should give Gen. David Petraeus the tools he needs to succeed in Iraq, the head of The American Legion said today.

“Gen. Petraeus and Ambassador (Ryan) Crocker both testified that the Coalition is making great progress in reducing violence in Iraq,” National Commander Marty Conatser said. “I have been to Iraq and have met with Gen. Petraeus. He is a man of honor and is a widely respected expert on counter-insurgency. We will not be able to win a war on terror if we set aside the requests of our military experts in the name of partisan politics.”

Conatser pointed out that delegates at the last three American Legion National Conventions have unanimously passed Resolution 169, a measure that supports the global war on terrorism, which includes Iraq.

“It would be unconscionable for Congress to have confirmed Gen. Petraeus as the commander in Iraq, authorized the operation there and then pull the rug from under him by not giving him the troops and funding that he needs,” Conatser said. “More than 4,000 Americans have died there. Every life is precious but let us not diminish the cause that they died for by surrendering to terrorists who would ravage the country if we withdrew prematurely.”

During his testimony before the Senate, Petraeus recommended that upon the withdrawal of the last surge brigade combat team in July, “a 45-day period of consolidation and evaluation” occur before further troop reductions. “This approach does not allow establishment of a set withdrawal timetable, however it does provide the flexibility those of us on

the ground need to preserve the still-fragile security gains our troopers have fought so far and sacrifice so much to achieve,” Petraeus said.

In spite of the significant progress, Petraeus warned that terrorists are still a threat in Iraq. “Al Qaeda is still capable of lethal attacks. And we must maintain a relentless pressure on the organization, on the networks outside of Iraq, that support it and on the resource flows that sustain it,” Petraeus said.

When asked by Sen. John Warner if the mission in Iraq has provided greater security here in the United States, Crocker responded, “First, in the little over a year that I have been in Iraq, we have seen a significant degradation of al Qaeda’s presence and its abilities. Al Qaeda is our moral and strategic enemy. So, to the extent that al Qaeda’s capacities have been lessened in Iraq, and they have been significantly lessened, I do believe that makes America safer.”

“Ambassador Crocker’s testimony made it clear that our troops in Iraq have made us safer here at home,” Conatser said. “We are fortunate enough to have outstanding men and women who are willing to put themselves in harm’s way to protect us. Let’s not jeopardize the safety of all Americans by not allowing our troops to do their jobs.”
